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OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



It's hard to believe it's spring of 2023 already. Where does the time go? The past year has been very rewarding for our staff and Board of Directors. Our team is dedicated to timely customer service and we're here for you. We continue to award several stability grants to many of you from the Federal government. I hope the money is helping you hire and retain staff, award salary increases and bonuses, and is supporting classroom and other business purchases.

I have continued to prioritize my time in the field with you. If I didn't visit you in 2022, please know I have a plan to get out to see you this year. Our Board members have enjoyed visiting providers and reading to children on our visits. Fortunately, we have been able to purchase children's books with grants and provide a copy to each child after the Board member reads to the class.

Our team is working very hard to complete the new CLASS assessment in our 750+ VPK classrooms. In addition, we have developed several webinars and trainings to support teacher development with this new assessment. Contract season is coming up fast so please be on the lookout for information from our provider relations team in the coming weeks.

We have prioritized teacher recruitment and retention at the Coalition. We have seen and heard from most of you about the ongoing staffing and budget challenges. We are bringing more credentialed teachers into our local workforce through our partnership with Pasco County's Marchman Technical College's Early Childhood Apprenticeship Program and Wesley Chapel's Adult Education Program. We are excited to share that we have partnered with Hernando County Schools to create a similar model at Wilton Simpson Technical College.

The apprenticeship program will offer opportunities for preschool teachers to continue their educational journey while earning a FREE Child Care Apprenticeship Certificate. In addition, participants will be provided with FREE materials and textbooks along with receiving Classroom Supply kits and participation bonus payments. Directors and owners are encouraged to reach out to our Early Education Advisor, Samantha Dominguez at s.dominguez@elcph.org for enrollment.

On behalf of the Coalition's Board of Directors and our staff, please allow me to thank you for your tremendous work and commitment to our children and families. I've had the opportunity to spend some time with directors from many counties within our state during the past few months. We've shared things from DCF regulations to grants, profiles, and training opportunities offered by our Early Learning Coalitions. While sharing with each other it became very clear to me that what we experience in a relational aspect with our coalition may be rare. Our coalition staff has worked tirelessly to become one of the most supportive entities to Providers. Dr. Knobl's leadership has provided a personal focus, therefore offering a variety of resources to assist each of us.

One of those recently offered resources is a program called MarcoPolo Learning, a digital tool for teachers, to encourage curiosity in children. As early educators, we strive to find a way to extend learning. MarcoPolo gives children screentime that is both educational and fun! It offers real-life videos and pictures as well as characters to help develop their creativity and problem-solving skills. Our families can also trust that it is safe, unlike much of what is accessible on YouTube. Teachers can send a "Class Trip" or individual playlists to view at home, which supports a child's individual need or class lesson. The fact that this is an extension from our classrooms into the home is a valuable advantage. Additionally, everything on MarcoPolo is also offered in Spanish.

As a director, the ability to offer supportive, fun resources to our teachers is an important part of equipping them for success. Staff retention can be enhanced by opportunities such as these. CELEBRATE LITERACY WEEK, FLORIDA!









January 23 - January 27, 2023



Summer is a time to slow down, spend time outdoors and have some fun!
While this change of pace is an opportunity for families to get more rest and relaxation, it's important that children still engage in activities that encourage learning.

The summer season provides plenty of ways for children to explore nature and discover science, so "find learning opportunities" does not have to be another addition to your to-do list. The outdoors provides the perfect setting for young children to experience physics, chemistry, and biology in ways that they can relate to and understand.

Swinging, sliding, and swimming are great examples of activities that your little one is likely already doing that also introduce her to the fascinating world of science.

Swinging back and forth on a swing set allows children to experience the effects of motion and gravity.
Children realize that as the swing comes to a stop, they must push off the ground to set the swing back in motion.

Slides allow children to experience the effects of gravity and friction.
Children realize they can slow down by pressing on the soles of their shoes or go faster by lifting their feet.

Children experiment with the scientific principle of buoyancy while learning to swim, asking questions like, "Why do I float sometimes and other times I sink?

It's not necessary for you to explain the science behind each activity—the experiences alone build a foundation for learning and help children grasp scientific principles later in life. But, to build on your child's learning and encourage his natural curiosity, consider explaining the science in a hands-on way by setting up simple experiments.



For example, if your child asks what she needs to do to float, try this interactive game to help teach her why some objects sink and others float:

- Help your child fill a bucket with water and gather miscellaneous items.
- Ask your child to predict if items will float or sink and ask for the reasoning behind each prediction.
- Allow your child to place the items in the water, one at a time. As each item is tested, let her change her prediction it shows she is thinking critically and refining her thoughts based on evidence. Listen to her observations each time.

 After your child has tested each item, ask her how the items that float or sink are similar to one another.


Finding ways to play with science this summer doesn't have to be complicated. Just follow your child and listen to her questions—science is everywhere!



As each item is tested, let her change her prediction—it shows she is thinking critically and refining her thoughts based on evidence. Listen to her observations each time.



EDUCATION PASCO'S APPRENTICESHIP'S MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Change. Change can be intimidating or invigorating. For the Child Care Apprenticeship Program of Pasco County, it has been a little of both. We were contacted in 2021 with an idea from the ELCPH to partner with our program to recruit and retain quality early childhood professionals using a newly acquired Preschool Development Grant.

At first, we were unsure of what this idea meant. Why us? What would this look like in our classrooms? How would this affect our well-established program in the county school system. We had always flown a bit under the radar, and were often a best kept secret in the industry. For the first time, we were being seen as a very





important and integral part of our community by people that hadn't known about our program previously. Our program was being recognized and advertised more than it ever had before. We were feeling very noticed and incredibly supported. While slightly overwhelmed by all of the changes, we went into this partnership with full faith and trust, unsure of what it would bring, and feeling a bit of trepidation with the unknown.

Fast forward to our fourth full semester, and coming up on the close of our second year in this partnership through the ELCPH and the Child Care Apprenticeship Program of Pasco County. We are no longer feeling any intimidation, but a sense of invigoration that

continues with each passing month.

Thanks to this partnership, we have put approximately 100 well trained early childhood educators into the classrooms of local childcare centers, head start programs, faithbased classrooms and before and after school programs across both sides of Pasco County, and into Hernando as well.

Our Apprentices work full time in their local child care setting, then attend our class one night a week for three hours from August- May. At the end of the program, they have completed 144 classroom hours, and 2000 on the job hours under the supervision of a journey worker.

While they've always had the support of their journey worker, classroom teacher and director/boss; thanks to the grant, we were able to add the role of Early Childhood Academic Advisor. Ms. Dominguez has been such a beneficial piece to our program. She has helped recruit people to the field, guide them through the educational and DCF journey, and continues to keep in touch with them and their employers after they graduate. This support has been crucial to building the numbers in our classrooms, but also in keeping them retained in the field.

We have seen such a feeling of excitement, pride and invigoration in each of our Apprentices. They are eager to get to cross the stage

in their cap and gown, earn their generous supply kit, and go on to mentor other educators in their workplace.

Students utilize the Promise Institute, attend the annual conference, reach out to the Early Childhood Academic Advisor with questions, and are letting others in their workplace and community know that they, too, should enroll in our class to earn their Staff Credential. Most importantly, they are teaching intentionally, and providing quality classroom environments to their children. They see this as a lifetime career and are staying in the field.

While it's been two years of change, we couldn't be more excited by the partnership we've had with the



ELCPH and the PDG grant. We feel invigorated and ready to see where the years continue to take us. Most importantly, when we visit our current Apprentices in their workplace, and see so many former students working alongside them, we are confident that we're making a difference in the Early Childhood profession and

helping our participating employers, families, children and educators in our communities.

The goal of the PDG grant with the ELCPH and our program was to recruit and retain quality early childhood professionals. We can all agree, that the goal has been achieved.

Therefore, trainings have included: Online options; Hybrid options; and Facilitated professional development for selected providers through grant funding.

OVERVIEW OF CLASSROOM ASSESSMENT SCORING SYSTEM AND STRATEGIES

Facilitated professional development for selected providers through grant funding. Includes online modules from Conscious Discipline, with participant workbooks and resources regarding Adult Social Emotional Learning, as well as Zoom sessions with presentations, participants taking the lead to present components of the concepts, live practice of concepts and classroom implementation of resources participants demonstrate, videos to share examples of application of concepts, ability to share ideas with one another to clarify questions.







Manuscripts should be prepared in current APA style (2009, 6th Edition). This style includes: typed, double-spaced, wide margins, and cover page with a working title, authors' full names, degrees, affiliations, and e-mail address for the lead author.

Manuscripts published by ELCPH address both the continuing interests of early childhood professionals and emerging ideas and issues in the field. Among topics considered are emergent curriculum for children from birth through age 8, effective assessment strategies, effective classroom practices that reflect sound theory and research, program administration, relationships with families, and public policy effecting early care and education.

The length of journal manuscripts ranges from 1 to 3 pages, including complete references. Please submit manuscripts as e-mail attachments to expedite the review process. Send to s.sabadishin@elcph.org with the subject heading SPOTLIGHT Manuscript. Manuscripts are reviewed and processed electronically. Manuscripts that are submitted in hard copy will not be reviewed.
