Laughter is one of the most natural and joyful sounds that children can make. When they begin to giggle as babies, laughter becomes a natural part of their social and cognitive development and continues throughout childhood. Laughter can be a natural stress reliever for all ages. Studies show that when we laugh, our brains release endorphins, the very chemical that can reduce stress for all ages.

Humor allows children to express themselves. It's enjoyable to hear their "made-up" jokes and giggles that follow! Laughter fosters connection with others, peer-to-peer and child-to-adult. As children grow up, they use critical thinking to solve silly riddles or wordplay and comprehension to understand punchlines.

Think of what you feel like when you laugh: relaxed tension, deep breaths, a smile on your face. Let's work on fostering our classroom or staff meeting environment where laughter is as natural and often as our words. STRENGTHENING EARLY LITERACY THROUGH FAMILY, SCHOOL, AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Early literacy is the foundation of a child's academic journey, shaping their ability to learn, communicate, and engage with the world. Today, many families, educators, and community organizations are actively championing early literacy development, fostering environments that nurture language and reading skills from infancy. Addressing early literacy gaps requires a multi-faceted approach that involves families, schools, and the community.

Joyce Epstein's theoretical model of family, school, and community partnerships provides a valuable



framework for understanding how collaboration among a child's support system can improve early literacy outcomes. Epstein identifies six key types of involvement: parenting, communicating, volunteering, learning at home, decision-making, and collaborating with the community (Van Voorhis, Maier, Epstein, & Lloyd, 2013). These elements guide educators in supporting meaningful family engagement to close literacy gaps.



PRACTICAL STRATEGIES FOR SUPPORTING EARLY LITERACY

1. Parenting: Creating a Literacy-Rich Home Environment

Parents play an essential role in developing early literacy skills. Research shows that children who are read to daily are exposed to 1.4 million more words by kindergarten than those who are not (Logan et al., 2019). Simple activities can strengthen literacy development at home:

- **Daily Storytime:** Reading to children for at least 15 minutes daily builds vocabulary and comprehension.
- **Interactive Conversations:** Asking open-ended questions about stories fosters critical thinking and verbal expression.
- **Environmental Print Exploration:** Reinforces literacy concepts by encouraging children to recognize letters and words in everyday settings, such as grocery store signs and food packaging.

Early childhood programs can support parents by offering literacy workshops, family reading challenges, and take-home activity guides. Studies indicate that literacy-related parental involvement can improve children's literacy competencies by 22% (Penderi et al., 2023).

2. Communication: Strengthening the Home-School Connection

Maintaining open communication with families ensures they have access to literacy-building strategies tailored to their child's needs. Effective methods include:

- **Weekly Newsletters:** Sharing book recommendations, phonemic awareness activities, and literacy milestones.
- **Parent-Teacher Conferences:** Providing specific literacy progress reports and customized at-home strategies to support children.
- **Communication Apps:** Utilize platforms like Procare, ClassDojo, or Remind to send daily literacy tips, activity ideas, and reading reminders.

Studies show that consistent, high-quality communication between educators and families increases parent engagement in literacy activities by 45% (National Center for Family Literacy, 2022).

3. Volunteering: Engaging Families in Literacy Activities

Encouraging parents to participate in literacy-focused events helps reinforce



early reading habits. Schools can:

- **Host Family Literacy Nights:** Featuring interactive read-aloud and hands-on literacy stations.
- **Classroom Reading Days:** Inviting parents to read with children and model expressive storytelling.
- **Literacy Activity Prep**
Volunteers: Encouraging families to assemble literacy kits or organize book donations to foster community involvement.

When parents engage in literacy-related volunteering, children demonstrate increased motivation to read and higher literacy achievement (Epstein & Sheldon, 2019).

4. Learning at Home: Providing Families with Literacy Resources

Equipping families with at-home literacy tools strengthens learning beyond the classroom. Take-home literacy kits can include:

- **Age-Appropriate Books:** Diverse, engaging picture books with discussion prompts.
- **Activity Cards:** Step-by-step instructions for phonemic awareness games and storytelling exercises.
- **Writing Materials:** Journals and dry-erase boards to encourage early writing skills.

5. Collaborating with the Community: Expanding Literacy Support

Strengthening community partnerships extends literacy learning beyond school walls. Effective collaborations include:

- **Library Partnerships:** Joining free storytime sessions, parent workshops, and book lending programs.
- **Book Distribution Initiatives:** Partnering with organizations like Dolly Parton's Imagination Library or New World's Reading to provide free books to families.

A National Institute for Early Education Research study found that children with access to community literacy programs demonstrate stronger reading skills and greater enthusiasm for learning.





When families and educators work together, they can ensure children enter kindergarten with the foundational skills needed for long-term academic success.

Closing the early literacy gap requires a collaborative approach that actively engages families, educators, and community partners. Joyce Epstein's model emphasizes the importance of shared responsibility in fostering literacy development. By implementing strategies that support parenting, communication, volunteering, learning at home, and community collaboration, early educators can equip families with the knowledge and tools to foster literacy at home. When families and educators work together, they can ensure children enter kindergarten with the foundational skills needed for long-term academic success.

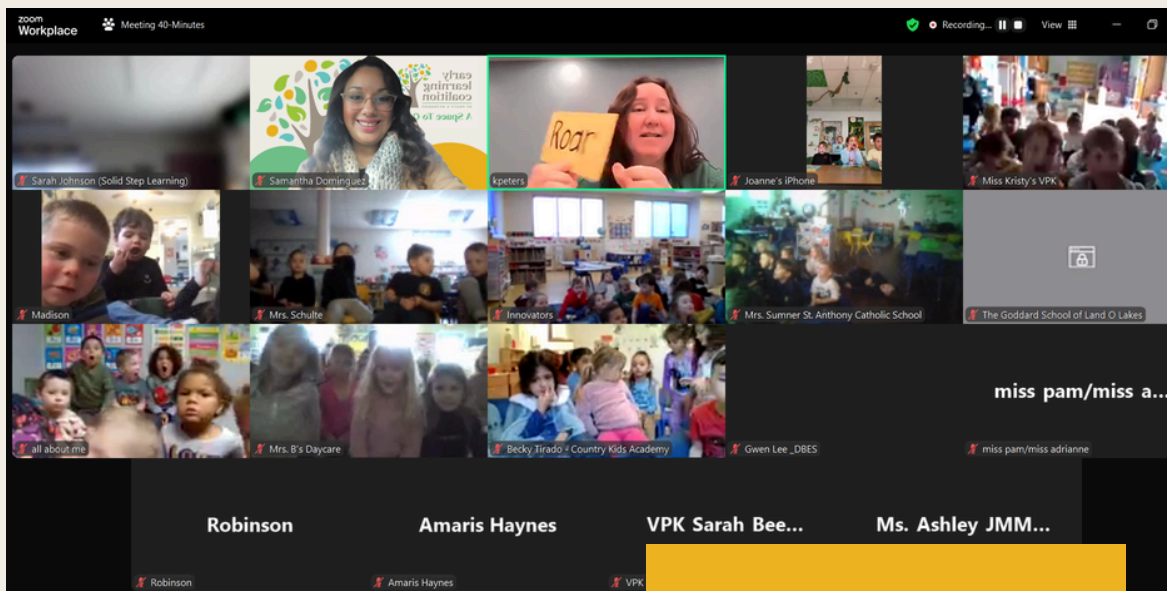

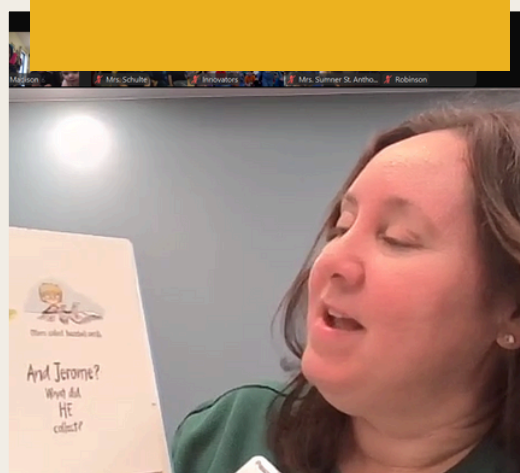

THE IMPORTANCE OF EARLY CHILDHOOD DIRECTORS SUPPORTING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Professional development (PD) for early childhood educators is critical to the quality of early childhood education. It directly influences teachers' competencies, instructional strategies, and the overall learning experiences of young children. As early childhood directors play a key role in setting the tone and vision of an educational environment, their support of teachers' professional development is essential. This support fosters a culture of continuous improvement, helps retain qualified staff, and ultimately enhances the developmental outcomes for children.

Enhancing Teacher Competence and Confidence

Supporting professional development allows early childhood teachers to stay updated on current research and best practices. Early childhood education (ECE) is a field

that is constantly evolving with new insights from child development research, psychology, and pedagogy. Teachers who engage in ongoing learning opportunities are better equipped to implement effective teaching strategies that cater to diverse learners. Directors who invest in these opportunities demonstrate their commitment to maintaining a high-quality educational environment.

Research underscores that teachers who regularly engage in PD feel more competent and confident in their teaching abilities (Sheridan et al., 2009). This confidence translates to better classroom management, more creative teaching strategies, and a deeper understanding of how to meet the developmental needs of children. Directors can support this by providing access to workshops, conferences, mentoring, and educational resources that align with the latest trends in early childhood education.



Improving Retention and Job Satisfaction

Teacher retention is a significant challenge in early childhood education. Many educators face low pay, high stress, and limited professional growth opportunities, leading to high turnover rates. Directors who prioritize their teachers' PD can counteract some of these issues by creating a supportive and enriching work environment. When teachers feel valued and see opportunities for professional growth, they are more likely to remain committed to their roles (Cumming, 2017).

A study by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) found that access to PD was a key factor in teacher retention (NAEYC, 2015). Directors who encourage and facilitate PD help foster a sense of belonging and professional purpose among staff.

This can lead to greater job satisfaction, which directly impacts the quality of interactions between teachers and children, as well as among staff members.

Promoting a Culture of Lifelong Learning

By advocating for and supporting PD, directors model the importance of lifelong learning. This sends a powerful message not only to teachers but also to families and children within the educational setting. A director's active participation in PD initiatives, whether through organizing in-house training, collaborating with other institutions, or even engaging in PD themselves creates a culture where continuous growth is the norm.

Directors can also establish professional learning communities, where teachers collaborate to reflect on their practices and share insights from their development experiences.

“ ...CONFIDENT AND SATISFIED TEACHERS”

These communities promote reflection and encourage educators to take ownership of their professional growth (Schachter, 2015). A supportive PD culture nurtures curiosity and openness to new ideas, qualities that are vital for educators working with young children who are themselves curious learners.

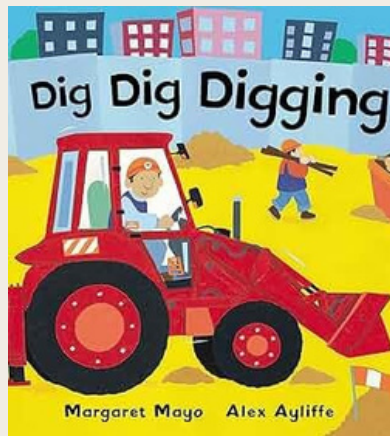
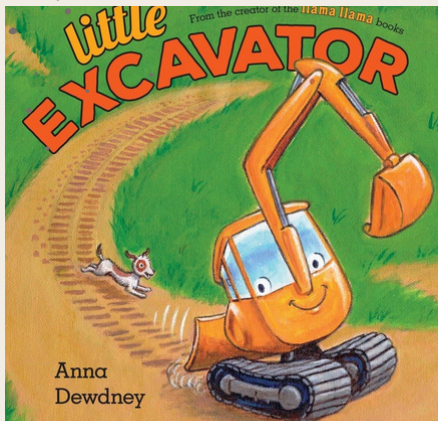

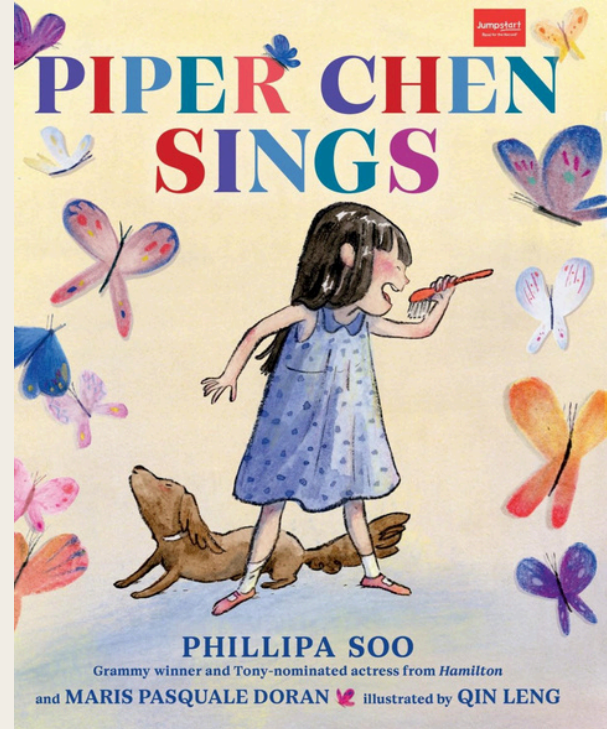

PRESCHOOL NAPTIME ... **WHY?**

As a preschool director, I frequently heard concerns about naptime: “Why does my child need to nap? Isn’t it a waste of learning time?” “My child doesn’t want to come to school because he doesn’t want to nap.” “My child doesn’t nap at home; why should he nap here?” “My child doesn’t sleep at night because he naps during the day.” Every

director and teacher has encountered these comments at some point. While accommodating parents is essential, we must consider whether bending too much to their requests is in the children’s best interest.

Research shows that naps are crucial for young children's brain development and memory. For instance, according to the article "Naps Crucial For Brain Development and Memory in Kids" in Neuroscience News (2024), naps help children process morning learning by allowing the hippocampus to consolidate information and form relationships and memories. Additionally, naps help children rest and reset their emotions for a productive afternoon.

Naptime, however, can be more stressful than helpful if not done effectively. Below are some tips to make the transition to naps smooth and stress-free:

- Before going outside, place mats with sheets, blankets, and special items with the children’s help.
- As they finish their lunch, direct the child to get a book or puzzle to take to their mat while they wait for the others to finish.
- Ensure that children use the restroom before settling on their mats for naptime.
- Read one or two short “bedtime” stories in a calm voice, following it with soft music.
- We can use comforting gestures like rubbing backs, stroking heads, or placing a hand on their backs to reassure them of our presence.
- Have children close their eyes, take a deep breath, and guide them through relaxation from their toes to their eyes. Children find this to be fun as they get to wiggle different parts of their bodies as they get their wiggles out and relax.

Working as a teacher can be very stressful. Even the most patient and professional teachers can feel overwhelmed. Once the children are asleep during naptime, teachers can take a break while the aide or director supervises. This allows them to relax, eat lunch, and prepare for the afternoon.

Children will not always nap, and you will have children that have “outgrown” the need for napping, however, it is still important that they have quiet time. They still need time to relax even if they do not sleep. To accommodate those children, try the following:

- Once the other children have gone to sleep, permit the child to rise and sit with the aide at the table. There, they may engage in coloring, quietly solve puzzles, read books, or assist the aide in preparing for the afternoon activity.
- Older preschoolers love to help with toddlers and infants. Let them become helpers in those rooms so long as it does not interfere with the teacher/student ratio and it is permitted by the classroom teacher.

Hopefully this article will help you be able to explain to your parents why napping is important, but gives you ideas on how to make naptime useful instead of stressful.

Together, our belief is that “every child, caregiver and teacher deserve the best possible resources on their road to success”! Executive Director, Dr. Steve Knobl along with the ELC staff and the ELC Board members, made “A Space to Grow” a priority, offering more quality professional development opportunities for early educators! The ELC recognizes the variety of needs of adult learners. Therefore, trainings have included: Online options; Hybrid options; and Facilitated professional development for selected providers through grant funding.

The Promise Institute also hosts additional opportunities, such as the Teach Bridge Scholarship, which complements the TEACH Children's Forum Scholarship by providing financial support for educators pursuing higher education while easing the financial burden on sponsoring centers. Additionally, grant opportunities, covering needs like staff retention bonuses, owner commitment bonuses, curriculum expansion, software & technology, and equipment & supplies are available that further support early childhood education initiatives in programs and home providers across Pasco and Hernando Counties.

OVERVIEW OF CLASSROOM ASSESSMENT SCORING SYSTEM AND STRATEGIES

Training focuses specifically on: Concept Development, Quality of Feedback and Language Modeling. This online training allows the learner to take the course at their own pace as an introduction, or to refresh, enhance and deepen their learning.

AND FACILITATED OPPORTUNITIES!

Facilitated professional development for selected providers through grant funding. This included online modules from Conscious Discipline. The program provided participant workbooks and resources regarding Adult Social Emotional Learning. Zoom sessions were organized with presentations. During these sessions, participants took the lead to present components of the concepts. Live practice of concepts and classroom implementation of resources were demonstrated by participants. Videos were utilized to share examples of the application of concepts. Additionally, participants had the ability to share ideas with one another to clarify questions.

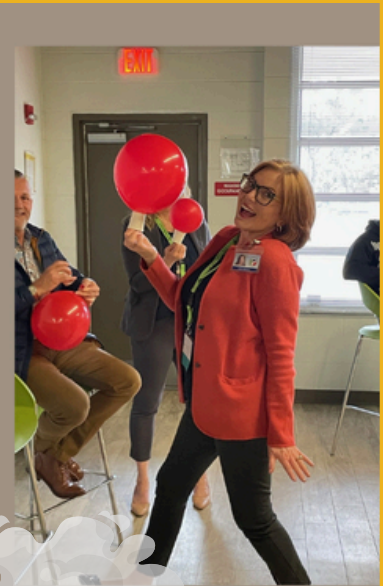

Our Children Have Rights



Shared parental responsibility means a court-ordered relationship in which **both parents** retain full parental rights and responsibilities with respect to their child. Parents are expected to communicate and confer with each other so that major decisions affecting the welfare of the child will be determined jointly.

When it comes to shared medical decision-making, **co-parents need to keep each other informed about their child's medical and healthcare situations.**

Here are examples of what should be shared between co-parents:

- The child's medical history, including any relevant, recent or anticipated changes
- Contact information of doctors & medical care providers
- Contact information & details for scheduled appointments and office visits
- Changes in the child's health status
- Medications the child is currently taking
- Changes in the prescriptions, dosages or directions
- All suggestions made by the child's healthcare provider or therapist regarding interventions, immunizations or procedures
- All emergency contacts and instructions

Medical decisions can have a significant impact on a child's health and well-being.

By communicating effectively, co-parents can more easily navigate the intricacies of medical decision-making. Clear and concise communication will avoid misunderstandings and future disputes and keep co-parents in sync. Above all, it will ensure that the child receives the best possible health care and medical treatments.

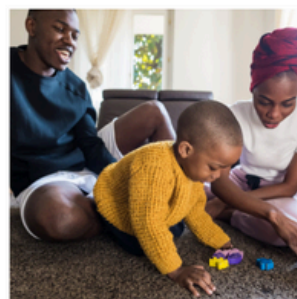
